Driving Directions

Syttende Mai Celebration - Sunday, May 19, 2019

Asbury Place is located at 2648 Sevierville Road, Maryville, TN 37804.
Directions from From I 40 using Pellissippi Pkwy towards Maryville

Go east on Pellissippi Pkwy (TN 140/TN 162)	13.3 Miles
Take exit 14; turn right onto East Broadway Ave (TN-33)	2.1 miles
Turn left onto Lincoln Rd at traffic light	.1 mile
Turn right onto Old Knoxville Highway	3 miles
Turn right at stop sign to stay on Brown School Rd	0.3 mile
Turn left onto Sevierville Road	0.5 miles
Turn right at entrance to Asbury Place	

The pavilion is at the east end of Lake St. Clair. There is a gate on Wilder Chapel Lane that leads to the pavilion. The gate should be open. There are only three spots to park vehicles next to the pavilion. Those spots should be used for handicapped parking or for unloading supplies.

There are several places on the map that show where cars can be parked.

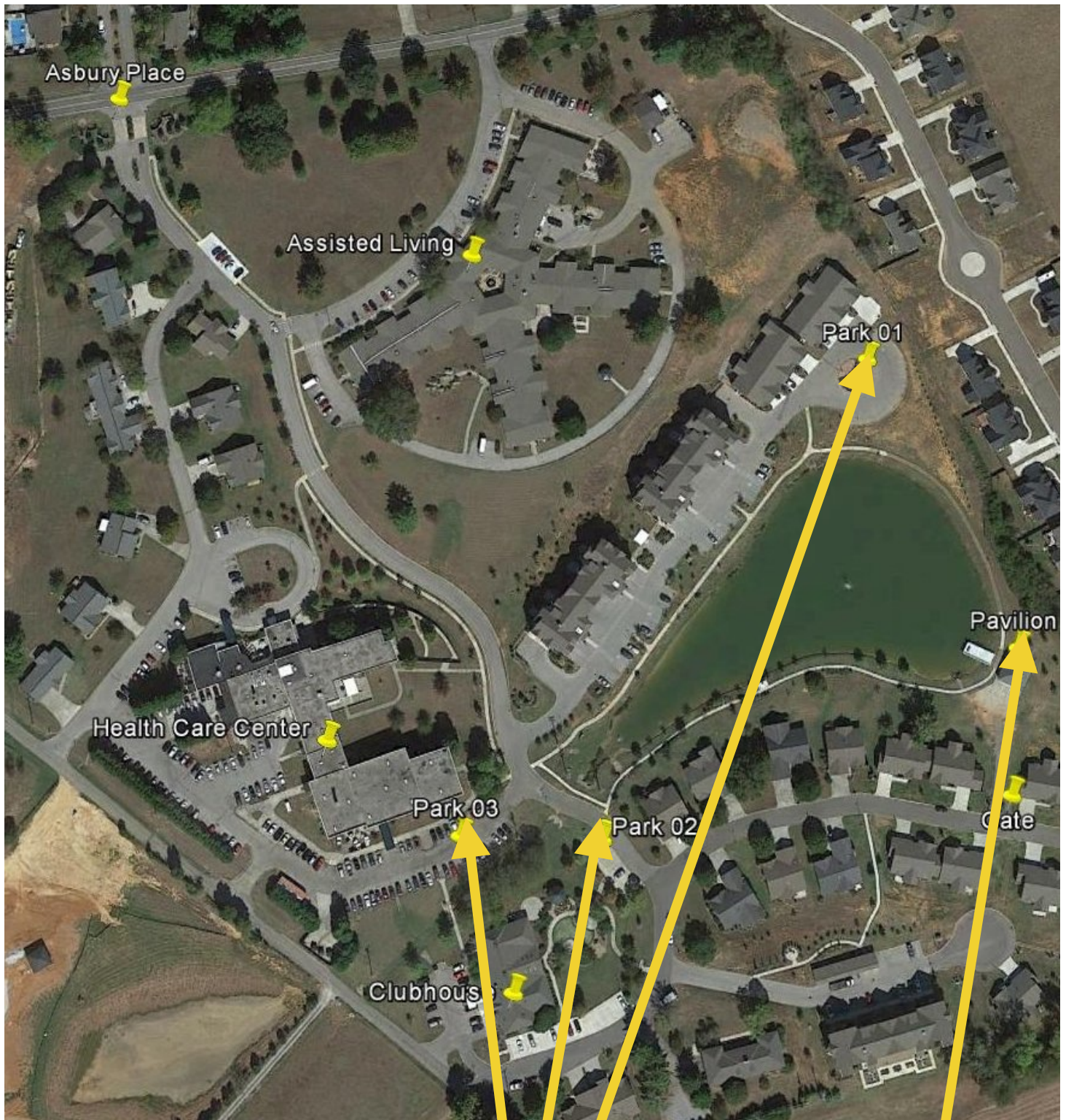
Parking area 1. St. Clair Lane. There are parking places all along St. Clair Lane. The spots closest to the pavilion are farthest in on the circle. It's a short walk around the east end of the lake to the pavilion from here.

Parking area 2. This area is close to the Clubhouse. From here, walk to the pavilion using the sidewalk on the south side of the lake.

Parking area 3. This spot is near the Health Care Center. From here, walk to the pavilion using the sidewalk on the south side of the lake.

Norwegian Constitution Day is the official National Day of Norway, celebrated on the 17th of May. Among Norwegians, the day is referred to simply as "Syttende Mai" (17th of May) or Grunnlovsdagen (The Constitution Day)

A noteworthy aspect of Norwegian Constitution Day is its very non-military nature. All over Norway, children parade with an abundance of flags. Each elementary school district arranges its own parade with marching bands between schools. The parade takes the children through the community, often making stops at homes of senior citizens, war memorials, etc.

The longest parade is in Oslo, where some 100,000 people travel to participate in the festivities. The Oslo parade includes close to 100 schools, marching bands, and passes by the Royal Palace, where the Royal Family greet the people from the main balcony.

Traditionally, the Lodge represents Sons of Norway in this annual event with a Viking Ship float. Lodge members may participate by either riding on the float or walking along side the float.

After the parade, there will be a picnic and everyone is invited to attend, even if they do not participate in the parade. More details coming soon!

From the Treasurer

Our net gain for the 12 months ending April 2019 is \$50, compared to a net loss of \$500 for the previous 12 months. Income from membership dues of \$650 was \$213 more than the previous 12 months.

The community events (Children's Museum International Festival and Taste of Scandinavia), had an income of \$597, compared to \$56 the previous 12 months (with no Taste of Scandinavia last year). Lodge events had a net loss of \$468 (chili cook off, July 4 picnic, lefse sale, Syttende Mai, Torsk dinner, and Juletefest). This compares to \$133 net loss for the previous year's lodge events (chili cook off, lefse sale, July 4 picnic, refreshments, Syttende Mai, Torsk dinner, baking badge, and, Juletefest). Additional expenses include \$660 for the District 5 Convention, insurance, office expense, and point of sale fees.

Our current assets are \$4514 in the Regions checking account and \$199 SON gift card. This compares to \$5048 for April 2018. Our \$419 liabilities include \$389 accrual for the 2020 SON district 5 biannual conference and \$30 for SON friendship pins.
