# From the Treasurer:

Our net income for January through March 2023 was \$125, compared to a net income of \$147 for the same period in 2022.

Total income was \$493, including \$127 income from the lefse sales at the International Festival, \$301 income from SON for our share of membership dues, and \$64 for lodge refreshments. All the expenses for the festival have not been received.

The \$368 in expenditures included \$251 for SON insurance, \$92 towards the next District 5 Conference, and \$25 to the SON Foundation.. This compares to \$272 expenses last January through March, which included \$125 for the next District 5 Convention, \$78 for Pizza & Movie Nlght, \$44 for refreshments, and \$25 for Ski for Light donation. There's an outstanding check of \$250 for Nordic Legacy Foundation application for Alyssandra Abelquist.

Our current assets are \$4,945 in the Regions checking account, compared to \$5,741 for March 2022. The only current liability is a \$1,067 accrual for the next SON District 5 biannual convention.

# God Påske --Happy Easter

So why do Norwegians say <u>Påske</u>? In Norwegian (or "pa Norsk") the word translates from the Hebrew for Passover. Early Christians kept the Passover, NOT Easter, with a new concept added to it, of Christ as the true Paske lammet (Paschal Lamb) continued to be observed. It was during a Passover Seder that Jesus proclaimed that the meal represented Himself and that He was instituting the New Covenant.

When the second-century Christian missionaries encountered the tribes of the north with their pagan celebrations, they did what Christian missionaries have always done; they attempted to convert them to Christianity. They did so, however, in the clandestine manner.

### "Easter"

The name Easter comes to us from Ostera or Eostre, the Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring, for whom a spring festival was held annually, as it is from this pagan festival that some of our Easter customs have come.

Eggs have always been associated with the Easter celebration. Nearly every culture in the modern world has a long tradition of coloring eggs in beautiful and different ways. "In Christian times, the egg had bestowed upon it a religious interpretation, becoming a symbol of the rock tomb out of which Christ emerged to the new life of His resurrection" (Francis X. Weiser.) The goddess, Eastre, was worshipped by the Anglo-Saxons through her earthly symbol, the rabbit.

### The Date of Easter

Prior to A.D. 325, Easter was variously celebrated on different days of the week, including Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, because Pesach, or Passover, falls on the Hebrew calendar dates of Nissan 15-22. In that year, the Council of Nicaea was convened by Emperor Constantine. It issued the Easter Rule which states that Easter shall be celebrated on the first Sunday that occurs after the first full moon on or after the vernal equinox (Spring). Therefore, Easter must be celebrated on a Sunday between the dates of March 22 and April 25.
